## First DPS Officers Graduate from School of Police Staff and Command

**C**ongratulations to Major Tommy Waldrop (Georgia State Patrol), Lt. Cyril Durrence (Motor Carrier Compliance), and Lt. Jack West (Capitol Police) on their graduation from the School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) at Northwestern University. Each successfully completed the ten-week Staff and Command program held at Kennesaw State University. They are the first Trooper, Motor Carrier Officer, and Capitol Police Officer to graduate from the program in DPS history. SPSC provides upperlevel college instruction in a total of 27 core blocks of instruction during each session which include leadership, human resources, employee



relations, organizational behavior, applied statistics, planning and policy development, budgeting and resource allocation. Each student is academically challenged through written examinations, projects, presentations, quizzes, and a staff-study paper. Upon successful completion, students may be awarded

a total of 17 units of graduate and undergraduate credits from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. The Center for Public Safety was established at Northwestern University in 1936 with the specific goal of expanding universitybased education and training for the law enforcement community.
